Germantown Was Home to the "Secretariat" of Harness Racing at the Turn of the 20th Century

It was not that long ago that every big county fair featured an oval track and races of home-grown trotters and pacers. Betting was, of course, a big part of this, as were large purses for the winners. Dating from the "horse and buggy days" when young men would race their buggies down the country roads in youthful competition, farmers would breed their horses for speed. The betting and large cash rewards turned some amateur dabbling to more serious enterprises.

The Standardbred became an official breed in 1879. The horses would pull a lightweight seat on wheels carrying a driver, and could only trot, or pace, breaking into a gallop would disqualify a horse from a race. Since the horse was in a harness rather than carrying a rider in a saddle, it was called Harness Racing.

Charles Waters was hopeful that the handsome bay colt he purchased for \$24 in 1895 would bring him some luck. He had been operating a fairly profitable stud farm for several years, but he needed standout stallion to really turn the farm into a market leader.


His farm, Pleasant Fields, had been handed down from his great uncle, Basil Waters. The house is still standing on Manor Drive on the east side of Germantown. Kinster turned out to be a very good purchase. In his first season in 1897 he was in the money in every race he was in, but not in the winner's circle.

In September of 1868 at the Rockville County Fair His regular driver was not available and so the reins were taken up by Thomas Cannon of Reidsville, North Carolina, who drove the colt to a record 2:27 for the mile. After that, Mr. Cannon drove him to wins at the state Fair in Timonium, and the Gentleman's Driving Park in Baltimore, improving his time at each.

Kinster's sensational triumph came on October 6, 1898 when he set a record of 2:16 ½ for the mile at the track at Prospect Park in Baltimore, dazzling the light harness world. This record he then repeated two weeks later at Hanover, Pennsylvania, thus insuring his future as a high priced stud. His final record before retiring was 2:14 ¾.

Acclaimed by the press as "King of the East Coast," Kinster would indeed bring fortune to Charles Waters' stud farm as people brought their mares to be impregnated by the famous stallion. Bred to one of Waters' own mares, he produced a filly named Kinstress who would top his own record by a half second.

The Zachariah Waters Burial Ground

The much beleaguered Burial Ground of the Zachariah Waters family is once again being threatened. Vandalized and then protected under the ownership of the Manekin Corporation; having an iron fence erected around it by the next owners, Lerch, Early and Brewer; cleared of brush and planted with flowers by an Eagle Scout project (2007); it is now being threatened with destruction by the present owner who wants to develop the property.

The Burial Ground is located next to the new Dorsey Mill Rd. at the end of Kinster Dr. Construction of the new road will include a retaining wall for the cemetery. The Burial ground holds the graves of 5 or 6 members of the Zachariah Waters family, one of the founding families of Germantown, dating 1824-1864. Waters Landing Elementary School is named in honor of this family.
